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Christoffel Jegher and his woodcuts The status of the artist in early seventeenth-century natural history

The Antwerp-born engraver Christoffel Jegher (1596-1652/3) is a noted figure in the history of seventeenth-century Flemish art mainly due to his collaboration with Peter Paul Rubens during the 1630s, which resulted in a series of nine large woodcuts – the only woodcuts that Rubens ever produced. This paper will explore the contrast between this prominent partnership and a lesser-known aspect of Jegher's career as a woodcutter: his association with the Plantin-Moretus press and, in particular, his involvement in the illustration of a natural history treatise by the Spanish Jesuit scholar Juan Eusebio Nieremberg, *Historia naturae*, published in 1635. The aim is to discuss Jegher's role as a multifaceted image-maker in a context marked by the appreciation of natural knowledge and its visual manifestations but also dominated by the hierarchies of artistic practice.
